
Betty, Bernie and April gave a review of happenings at the Spring Fling held on April 26th.

You know you want to do this. It would be a great time to spend with a friend, children and family.


In my Brain Power class they said it is good to try something different—so here we go!

WHAT IS A POLLINATOR PARTY?

This event drew almost 30 people to Justin Trails Resort Mother's Day afternoon for a very informative and fun afternoon.

Joey Esterline shared her knowledge of native plants, why to plant them, and the benefits to native wildlife and insects obtained from those plants. She cautioned against purchasing plant seed mixtures that may contain invasive species. Joey is an avid supporter of the Monarch butterfly, having tagged hundreds of them since the 1990s. Creating a Monarch Waystation is one way to create, conserve, and protect Monarch habitats. Check out the website www.monarchwatch.org.

A very excited young lady, Thyra Davey, dressed in a bee suit, joined her Mom, Melissa Davey, sharing the book, "Rusty Bumble, A Bee's Story". Melissa wrote the book. Their family lives in Minneapolis. It's a well illustrated and fun book. It highlights the Rusty Patched bumble bee's purpose, its food and habitat needs, as well as ways to protect pollinators.

Justin Nooker, a habitat biologist from the Bureau of Natural Heritage Conservation (DNR) spoke on what Wisconsin has to offer as far as natural areas. There are hundreds of them in the state and a few in our county. He is also connected with the Prairie Enthusiasts, and spoke on some of their work with habitat. He noted that books by Doug Tallamy, "Nature's Best Hope" and "Bringing Nature Home" were excellent resources. "Butterflies of North America" by Jeffrey Glassberg was another recommended book for its excellent illustrations.

Steve Krause's interactive bee display got a lot of attention. He and his wife brought honey and bee products to share at the event. You can usually find them at the Sparta Farmer's Market.

Plenty of art activities were available for children, attendees made plans to exchange seeds and plants, and there was talk of forming an informal group to help people with habitat ambitions and work.

Thank you Dawn Justin and Justin Trails for planning and hosting this wonderful event; and to Prairie Moon Nursery for native seeds and the gift packet filled with information.

There is much more to share. We will do that at another county HCE event this summer. Stay tuned.


